

Reading for meaning

When reading a longer text, you need to approach this differently to reading a short note, notice or message. Begin by skim reading the text to prepare yourself for reading. Once you have done so, ask yourself the following questions:

- What is this text about?
- Where does it happen?
- Who is it about?
- What type of book is this? Will it be serious, scary or funny?

The title of a book, a chapter or an extract from a book gives you the best clue to this last point. Look at the cover, read the blurb (text) on the back cover of the book and look at any illustrations. Then read the first paragraph of the extract or story.

I gave Roger something to eat under the table, and listened to the family arguing. I forgot all about my exciting new discovery. Larry finished his meal and went to the front room to get his cigarettes. He came back, sat down in his chair, put a cigarette in his mouth and then opened the matchbox that he had brought with him.

Now I am sure that the female scorpion didn't want to hurt anyone. She was worried and angry at being shut up in a matchbox, and she jumped at the first chance of escape. She ran out of the box and up Larry's hand with her babies on her back and then stopped, her tail dangerously high in the air, unsure of what to do next. Larry felt her running over his skin and looked down, and from that moment everything went crazy.

He gave a cry of fear, Lugaretza dropped a plate on the floor, and Roger came out from under the table barking wildly. Then Larry threw the scorpion on the table. She landed between Margo and Leslie, and her babies fell off all over the place. Then she ran towards Leslie. Leslie jumped up from his chair and knocked her away with a napkin. Now she ran towards Margo who screamed like a railway engine. Mother, who couldn't understand why everyone was shouting and jumping up and down, put on her glasses and looked at the table to see what was making them act so strangely.



Baobab trees

Some people say that when the world began, each of the animals (on / in / by / out) Earth was asked to plant a tree. All the animals (planting / planted / plants / have planted) their trees properly, but the hyena planted (his / their / him / they) tree upside down. Others say that the tree was pulled up out of the ground and thrown into a hot, dry part of the world. The tree landed upside down and (grow / growing / grows / grew) like that afterwards. This is the tree we call the baobab tree, so you can understand (where / why / who / what) some people call it 'the upside-down tree'.

The baobab grows in Madagascar, Africa and Australia and was introduced into Asia as well. Reading for detail

Reading for specific information and detail

- Look out for key words (facts, numbers, names) in questions and in the text you are reading.
- Use a dictionary to look up words that you do not understand.
- Read and reread sentences to make sure you understand them.

Emperor penguins

The Antarctic is the southern polar area on Earth. In winter it is a very cold place. The temperature can drop to below -50°C and the

(winds) can blow up to (300 kilometres per hour.) Amazingly, there are

animals that live in these harsh conditions) The Emperor penguin is one such animal.

Adapted to their environment

Like other birds, Emperor penguins have feathers to protect them from the weather. Emperors have several layers of feathers, like scales, that are not easily lifted in the wind. They have claws on their feet to grip the ice and there are special fats in their feet which stop their feet from freezing. They have layers of fat on their bodies and short bills and wings (called flippers) which help to conserve their body heat. These adaptations help Emperor penguins to survive the extreme temperatures.

Penguins also help each other to keep warm in winter by huddling together in groups. The penguins on the outside of the group shield the penguins in the middle of the group. When the penguins on the outside get too cold, they move to the inside of the group and other penguins move to the outside of the group.

Penguin chicks

Each pair of penguins produces one egg only each year. The egg is kept warm under the abdomen of one of the penguins until the chick hatches. When the chick hatches it has to be kept warm until it is stronger and the temperature is warmer. The parents take turns to keep the chick warm under their abdomens. As soon as the chick is old enough, they will teach it to swim, dive and find its own food.

Costa Rica

Have you ever seen a quetzal bird? There are lots of them in Costa Rica. This Central American country is well-known for its beaches, volcanoes and biodiversity. There are large, protected rainforest areas which are teeming with wildlife, including spider monkeys and quetzal birds.

If you visit Costa Rica, you will not only be able to enjoy the wildlife but you can also get actively involved in wildlife conservation. The entrance fees that you pay to visit parks and reserves are all used to fund conservation projects. You can also have a 'working holiday' and volunteer to help with certain projects. You can volunteer to help feed and look after rescued animals in animal sanctuaries or help look after endangered sea turtles, for example. What a wonderful way to spend a holiday!


